NEW YORK, May 20 (AP). Shri Meher Baba, Indian mystic, has come to the land of talkies and loud speakers to break his seven years silence.

He maintained his vow as he arrived on the Bremen from England yesterday by shunting a number of questions to his English secretary, Quentin Tod. For such personal communication as he saw fit to make he was armed with a small black board on which were painted letters of the alphabet and nu-

"Investigators from this point," colonel Schwarzkopf's bulletin continued, "are getting all data possible on the recent attempted King kidnapping in an endeavor to determine whether the perpretrators could be linked with the kidnap pers in this case.

"A known gangster while passing through Maryland stated that he had information in the Lindbergh kidnapping and just prior to the finding of the body stated that the child was dead. Investigators from this point are now endeavoring to

locate this gangster. Colonel Schwarzkopf closed his bulletin with the statement that there has been no change in the health condition of the Lindbergh family "so far as we can observe

CONVICTION OF MARCUS UPHELD

NEW YORK, May 20 (AP) .-The Appeliate Division of the Supreme Court today upheld the conviction of Bernard K. Marcus, president of the closed Bank of out of control. Another fire was at United States; Saul Singer, executive vice president, and Singer's son Herbert, an officer in one of the bank's affiliates, on charges of misapplying funds of the Muni-Company. Neither fire had been cipal Sa'e Daposit Company, a subsidinry of the bank.
